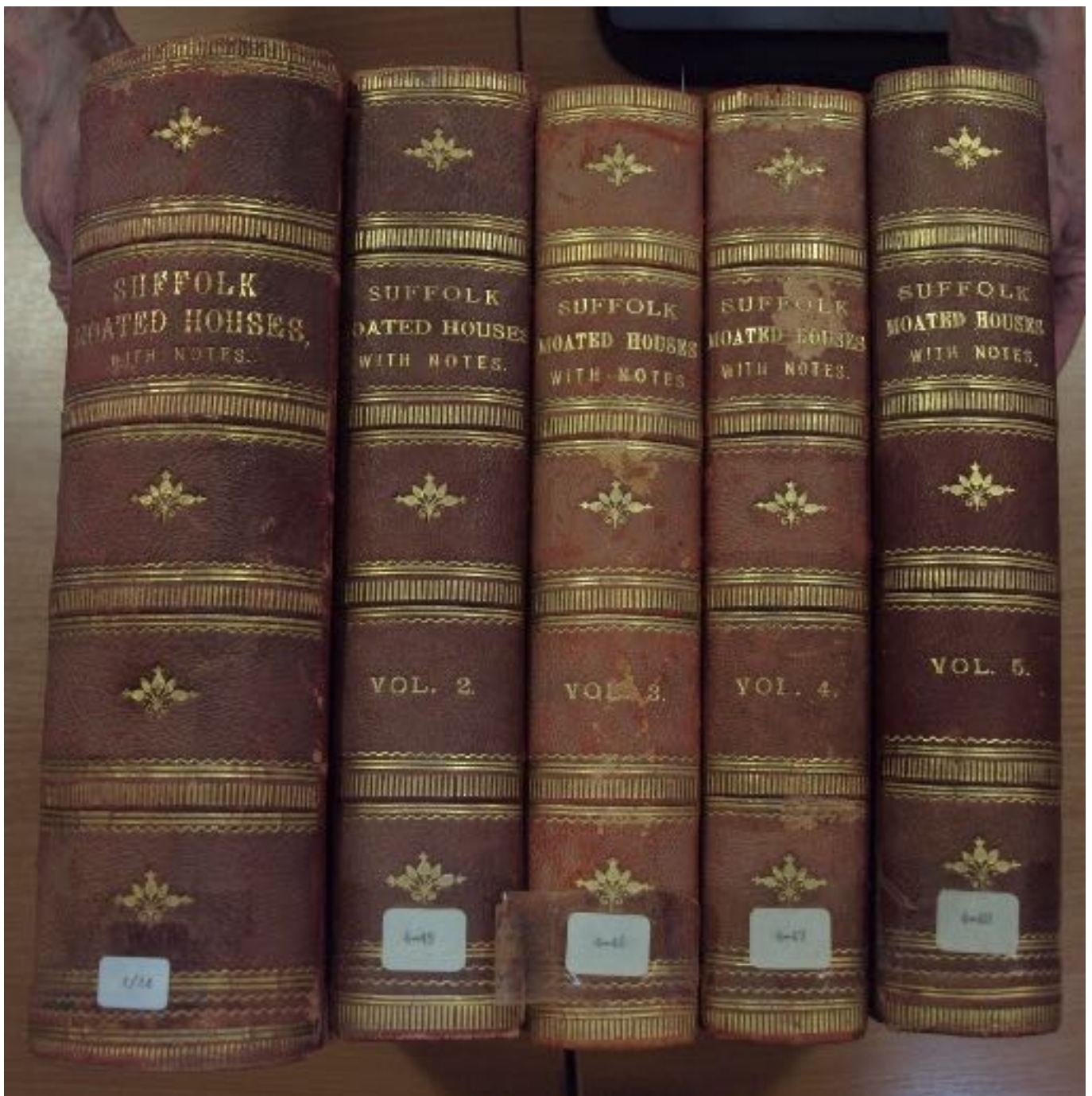

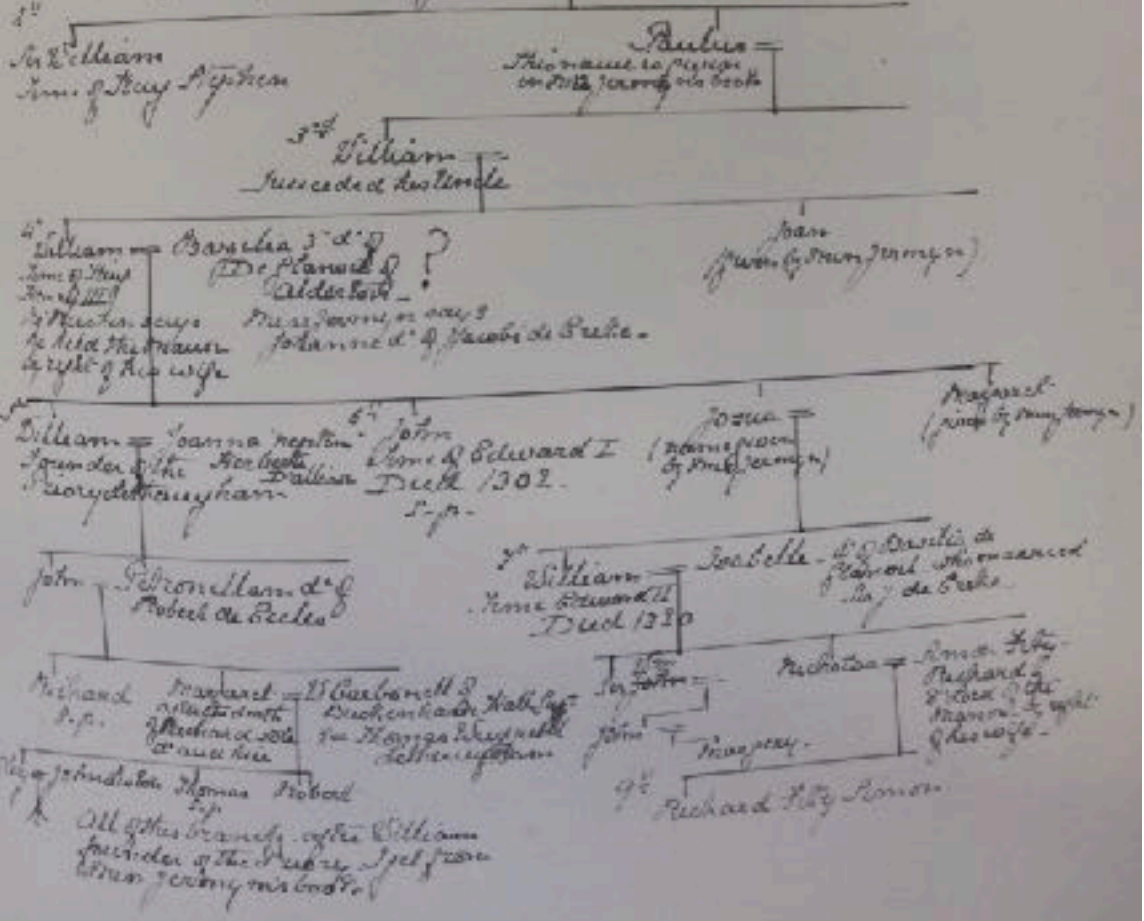

Lethbringham

Family of Bovile

concerning the Lords of the Manor of Lethbringham. I find 2nd 1172
 de Bovile are called at the time of King William II. but it seems
 held the Manor under the Plantagenets. but in the 12th century
 lion held it by right of his wife. Rosita daughter of Sir de
 Bovile - St. Peter. so says Sir Percy B. B. in his
 book on Lethbringham. In the pedigree of the Plantagenets
 it gives Isabella daughter of Barthelemy as under regent
 of William de Bovile of Lethbringham - from whence
 who generally comes from Sir Richard P. also gives
 it as Isabella. I am inclined to think they are right
 but in all other respects I shall follow the list given by
 Sir B. B.

First Bovile who appears as Lord of the Manor is
 Ra. 25. Richard de Bovile
 (a Philip) Knight.



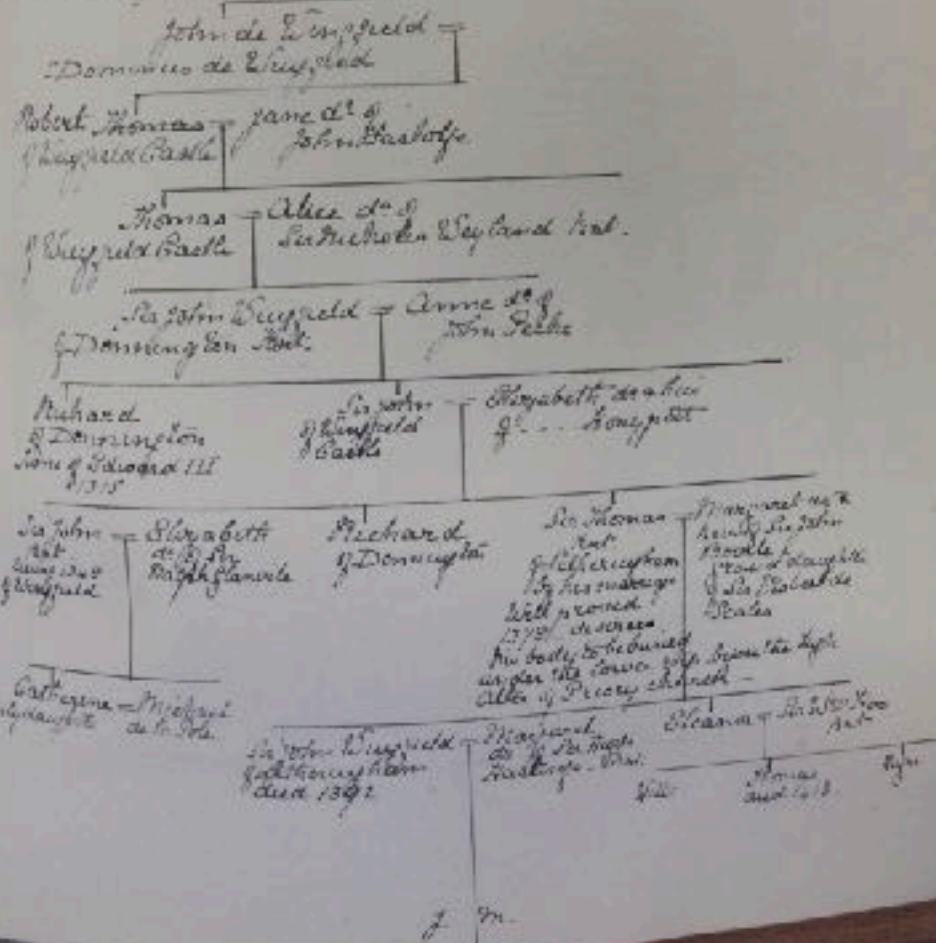

Cletheringham

Wingfield

The Wingfields took their name from the parish of Wingfield in the ~~Forest~~ Hundred where they were seated from the time of the Norman Conquest. In the 14th century they removed to Cletheringham and Cusston. Sir Anthony Wingfield who was created a baronet in 1687 built the Hall at Cusston and made a new coat. But it did not remain in the family many years for a successor of Sir Anthony sold it to the Duke of Grafton (Countess Carl of Wexford by King William III)

The Wingfields - being in Cletheringham descend from Robert Wingfield who is mentioned in several of the Domesday

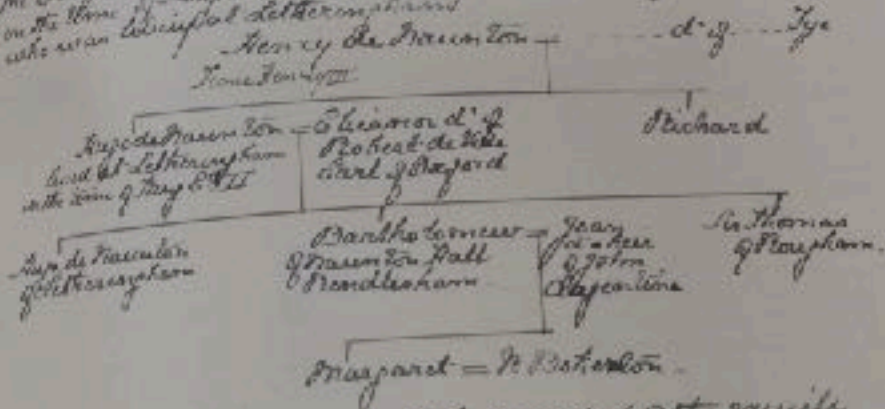

The Family of Haunton

The ancient family was seated at Bandalsham soon after the conquest - but the first I can find any mention of, is on the Stone of King-Benedict - Henry de Haunton father of those who was Bishop of Exeter



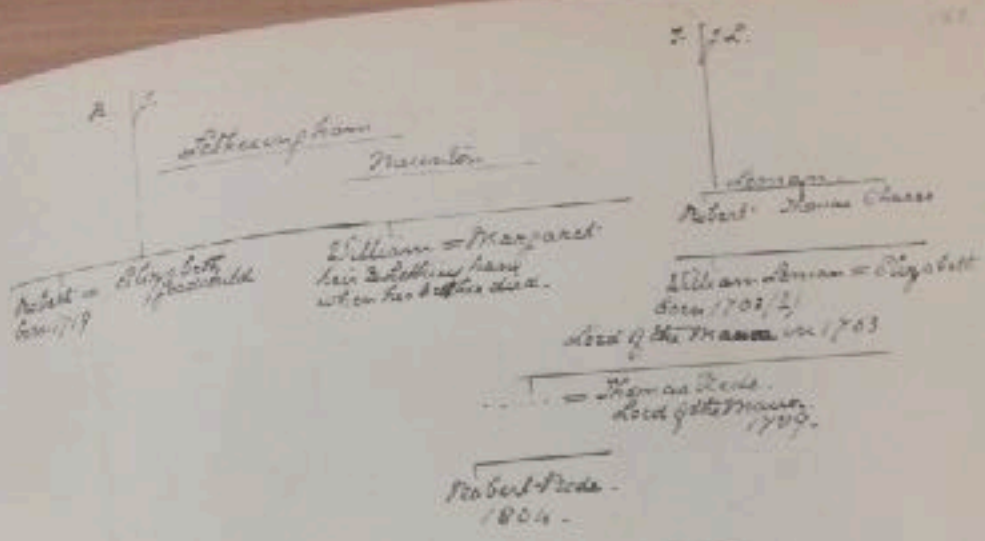
After this nothing seems to be recorded of the family till a William Haunton who was living in 1503, and married into the Dreyfild family - found it was about the time they appear to have been seized with a curious mania of writing their history of themselves and their connection on their tombs -

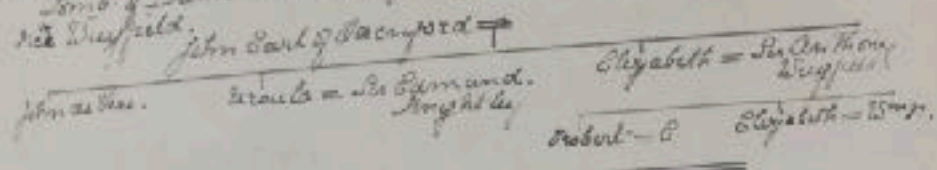
Elizabeth 3^d daughter of Sir Anthony Dreyfild - the Priory of Leithcringham, was granted at the death of Sir Anthony, and was re-granted in 1553, to Elizabeth, the widow of Wm Haunton, for a reserved rent of 20 - 2 1/2 s per year. She was buried in the church in the same tomb with her husband.

Elizabeth Dreyfild, wife of Sir Edmund Dreyfild, and one of the coheirs of John Bael of Bandalsham, sometimes a vicar of this church, wife of William Haunton; daughter to Sir Anthony Dreyfild, Bart of the Tower, and to Elizabeth another of the coheirs of the said Sir Anthony Dreyfild, and sister of the forbes of Inverkeithing, which Ursula deceased in the year of our Lord 1553, and Elizabeth in the year 1572.

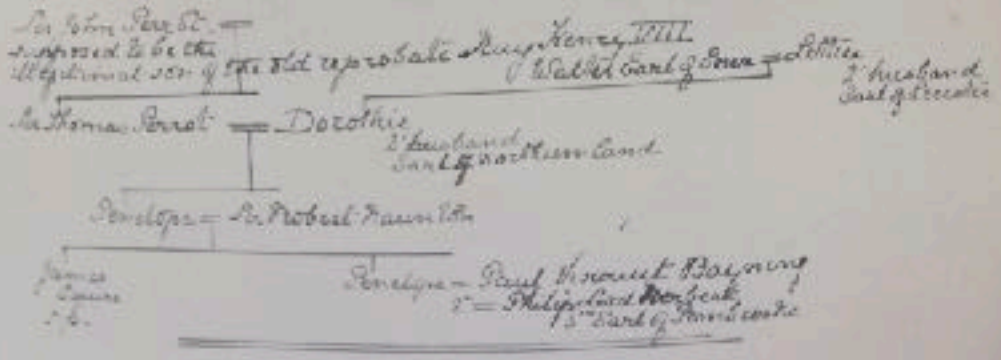

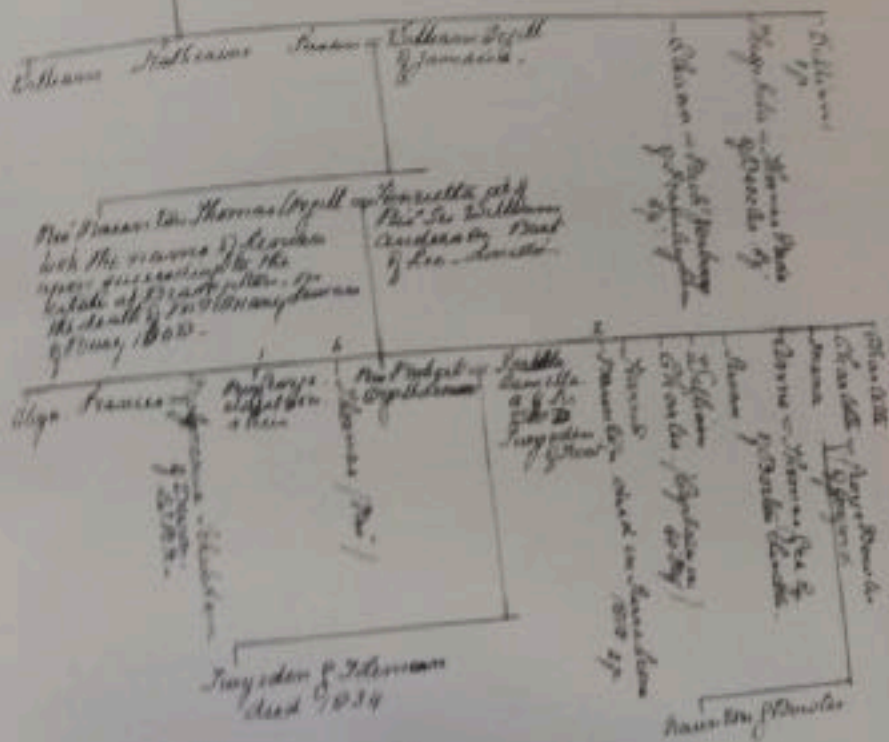

Nassau Carl of Rochford

William Henry Nassau was a personage high in favour with King William III. and accompanied him to England in 1688. He was son of Frederick de Nassau - Mary d. of An William III's great-grandson. Count of Juliers, in the Province of Strucht. Chamberlain of the King. (Natural son of Frederick Henry, King of Orange) Catherine, consort of the King.

William Henry Nassau - June 1st to the Queen Consort of Denmark. He came to England with King William III. and in consideration for eminent services was created Baron of Baginbald in Kent, and Earl of Rochford in Essex. in 1695. He purchased the Wiggfield estate in Wetheringham and Easton of Sir Henry Stuyvesant. and occasionally resided in the latter parish - He died at Juliers 1700.

William Henry Nassau 5th Earl of Rochford. In the death of his brother - Down 1754. Died 1820. at White House in Easton. 1777 - unmarried. The title became extinct and the estate was inherited by Alexander Hamilton, 10th Duke of Hamilton.

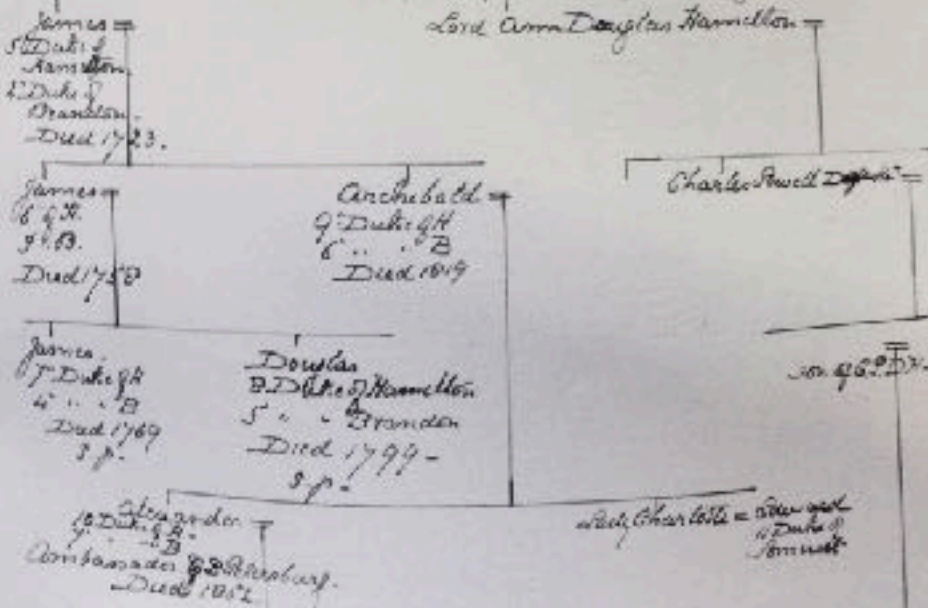
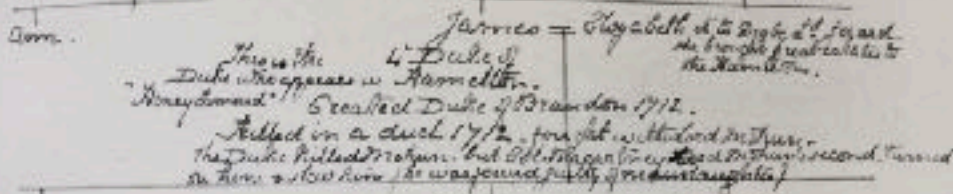
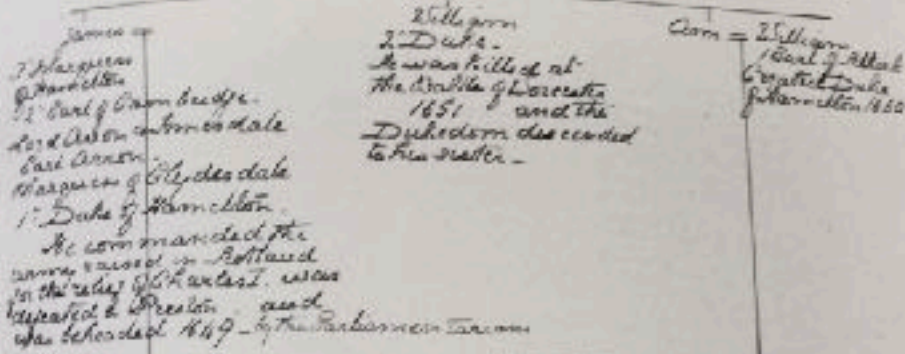

 on Suffolk, as one of the able and industrious Antiquaries
 whose attention has early directed to the elucidation of
 the Antiquities of Suffolk, and his collections in this
 his private department were more ample, and
 profusely enriched with accurate drawings of
 arches, monuments, seats, buildings, &c. - Indeed
 a more choice or valuable treasure of Suffolk Topography
 and of works in illustration of it, had been seldom or ever
 collected.

He inherited, by will, his estate in the parish of
 Trowley, & Norton, and resided here for some years.
 He served as High Sheriff of this county in 1805. Died
 1825 at his residence in Charles Street, Berkeley Square.

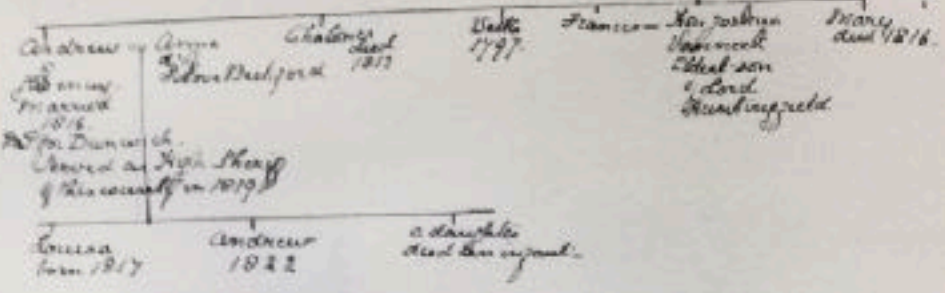
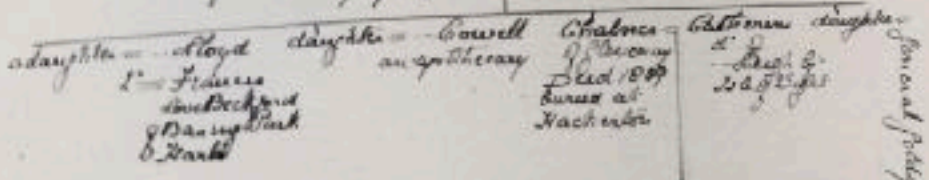
